Safeguarding Concern: The following has been brought to our attention. The book which inspired the Wicked film is too explicit for children, parents have warned. Gregory Maguire's novel, Wicked: The Life and Times of the Wicked Witch of the West, has been pulled off Christmas present lists this year after mothers on parenting forums voiced their shock at its "adult content".
